The opening of this second residential house allows for the admittance of new boarding residents; both houses currently have available boarding space. The admissions team is interviewing new boarding applicants and welcomes new applications.

During August Camphill School hosted a basic Occupational Health and Safety Training for the Educational Sector facilitated by Bodene Barnes from the National Occupational Safety Association. Teachers Trip to Napier

On 29 August, the teachers visited the large Agulhas School of Skills in Napier to observe the school's workshops.

This is a "Trade" High School for children who would not be able to achieve the mainstream grades, but are skills-capable. They do 50% academic work and 50% practical.

We viewed the hospitality (cooking) class, sewing, (similar to ours, but also dress-making) woodwork (chairs, benches), metalwork and welding (gates, burglar-bars) and the vegetable gardens.

They also had a wonderful new hair salon and a bricklaying workshop. They are so fortunate to have these large workshops. All the basic skills are taught in each specific workshop.

The visit was very worthwhile for all of us. The teachers learned how beneficial it would be to utilize these workshops in our school and are excited to begin formulating them. The staff here have formed relationships with businesses in Napier and Bredasdorp, where many of their pupils go for 'shadowing' and apprentice work, and many get employed after school. We were really impressed by the friendliness and caring attitude of the staff, who are very proud of the achievements of this school.

It was sad to say goodbye to the co-workers who spent a year with us and we will cherish all the special memories we shared. Our children are missing you dearly.


