The first term brought new learners to the school, new faces working in the boarding facilities and changes to the school schedules.

The school has adjusted schedules in order to allow for an earlier start of the school day and an earlier home time in the afternoons on a trial basis for the duration of the first term to test the practicality of this arrangement. This was done on behest of learners and parents as our learners usually only got home at 1600 or 16h30 which did not leave them much play time before evening meals. Learners are also now allowed to wear grey and white school uniforms if they so desire.

We solved our communication problems by means of an automated messaging service which now provides parents, staff and teachers with instant updates and communications from the school.

At our very successful parent / teacher meeting held on the evening of 19th March parents expressed their satisfaction with all the arrangements mentioned in the paragraphs above. The parents really enjoyed the classroom visits and were impressed with their children's work.

Our school building is aging and in need of renovations and repairs. Thanks to the hard work of our fundraisers Camphill Foundation USA has provided funds to support this project. We are very grateful as the roof and windows need urgent attention before winter sets in Renovations will start after the Easter weekend.




Our learners have been enjoying the swimming pool on hot summery days.


Ian von Memerty known as 'captain entertainment' will be performing
